

Family members reply to survey

A survey about family activities was sent to family members after the last newsletter. Although the number of respondents was not large, the responses represented a lot of thoughtful and useful ideas. We had at least one respondent from each major age category, but the aunts and uncles were the most numerous respondents.

Respondents mentioned the following among things they liked about the Reunion: p.j. party (3); Saturday evening (2); Thursday night potluck; golf; youth contests; visiting; pontoon boating; T-shirts; and skits from earlier years. Several commenters suggested that Saturday afternoon be replanned so that activities were not all going on at the same time. Several also felt that too much time was spent on awards during the Saturday evening program.

Suggestions for activities to help the younger generations get to know each other better included a big sister/brother or buddy program for different generations to spend time together or fun contests pairing different generations. Other suggested activities included paddle boat contest, dancing, hoola-hoop contest, surveying participants closer to the reunion, and listing everyone's room number.

Comments on the newsletter indicated that everyone like the quality, especially the color pictures. Suggestions for improvements included presenting research on family history (from a respondent in the less than 14 year old age group); having the older generation submit stories and pictures about the family; creating a section on family trivia; and creating an information card with a return address for family

members to send news for inclusion in the newsletter. Your editors will make the changes as new material, with your help, becomes available.

All commenters who mentioned the family tree found it useful and there was one suggestion for a change of format.

All the respondents had stayed at the Jenny Wiley Lodge and had no adverse comments about the facilities. The aunts and uncles wanted rooms on the ground floor so that it would be easier for them.

There were so many useful ideas from this small sample that we will provide the survey to be filled out at the 1992 Reunion. Remember, if your suggestions are not known, they cannot be implemented!

the Reunion. The quilt is a masterpiece of family artwork and will be treasured for years to come.


Teddy and the General

Opal Hatfield receives special recognition

Opal Stafford Hatfield has maintained a keen interest in local events since her retirement from teaching in 1974. She attends Georgetown Town Board meetings on a regular basis--they don't start without her. As she says, "I like to know what is going on!" On May 4, 1992, the Town Board recognized her active participation in civic activities with a special award. Her endeavors were commended "for distinguished concerned commitment to our community of Georgetown, Indiana."

Opal spent 43 years teaching elementary students in Kentucky and Indiana. She taught her own four children in the third grade. Son, Teddy Clyde, says he was spanked every day so that the other students would not think he was being favored! Opal's quilts are distinguished by her neat hand stitching, her unusual patterns of color, and her distinctive backings. She has used some traditional mountain patterns, but some of the quilt blocks are original works. For example, Clyde and Opal collaborated for three years on a very special quilt for Nina Rose. Clyde did much of the art work and Opal did the stitching for a quilt in which each block represents something about Nina Rose's life. She has also made some quilted, original wall hangings. She has used Mountain Mist Batting in so many quilts that the company sent her two free rolls!

In addition to all these activities, Opal keeps local children educationally up to date with World Book encyclopedias. Many of her neighbors bring her apples and vegetables, so she is busy every season maintaining that traditional mountain art of home canning. Ed Rader supplies her with green beans, beets, cabbage, and corn. She does not want anything to go to waste.



Sheryle weds Bill


